FATHER LIAM SAYS: You can get a lot of information about the way your Diocese operates not only from the Diocesan Directory but also on-line. There are a number of consultative bodies that the bishop regularly meets with. These include groups such as the Deans, the Chapter of Canons, the Episcopal College, the College of Consultors, the Council of Priests. Our Diocese is no different to any other in this part of the world in this regard. All the members of these bodies are priests. There are other groups that the Bishops consult such as Diocesan Finance Committee, the Education Committee and Diocesan Charity trustees, which have a number of clergy on them. In my 56 years as a priest in this Diocese, I am glad to say that I have never been a member of any of these august bodies, nor indeed, I am even happier to say, have I ever been invited to join any of them. I am sure they do great work – but it seems to me to be evidence of far too much influence being in the hands of the clergy. Clericalism is the name given to a situation where over-due importance is afforded to the clergy. The clergy are a tiny proportion of the membership of the Church. In all of our Dioceses the proportion has been shrinking for the past fifty years and is set to continue to do so. When will their dominance begin to shrink? Since his election in March 2013 Pope Francis has often railed against clericalism. He frequently mentions it in talks and it is a factor in his negative views about ambitious members of the Roman Curia. This is what he said in his opening address to the last Synod, devoted to the Youth of the Church. 'It is therefore necessary to decisively overcome the scourge of clericalism. Clericalism arises from an elitist and exclusivist vision of vocation that interprets the ministry received as a power to be exercised rather than as a free and generous service to be given. This leads us to believe that we belong to a group that has all the answers and no longer needs to listen, to learn anything or that pretends to listen. Clericalism is a perversion and is the root of many evils in the Church. We must humbly ask forgiveness for this and above all create the conditions so that it is not repeated.'

In an open letter to the people of God in August 2018 he said: 'Clericalism not only nullifies the character of Christians but also tends to diminish and undervalue the baptismal grace that the Holy Spirit has placed on the heart of our people. Clericalism, whether fostered by priests themselves or by lay persons, leads to an excision in the ecclesiastical body that supports and helps to perpetuate many of the evils that we are condemning today. To say 'no' to abuse is to say an emphatic 'no' to all forms of clericalism.' Here, Pope Francis is saying that in some cases it can happen that parishioners can contribute to this scourge when they place their priests on pedestals. He is warning against turning proper respect for the clergy into special treatment.

After the Protestant reformation various Catholic leaders attempted to reform the clergy. The lives of many priests were so scandalous that this was one of the reasons why the Reformation took off. Many church leaders very successfully introduced various seminary formation programmes. They were not attempting to establish the priesthood above the laity for the sake of 'lording' it over them but to call the clergy to authentic pastoral care and service. They emphasised that all the baptised share in Christ's priesthood. They applied the language of 'alter Christus' Latin for 'another Christ) to all the baptised, not simply to priests. Only later did this begin to be more and more restricted to the clergy.

Seminary authorities, I'm sure, are very aware of the efforts they must continue to make to imbue candidates for the priesthood and the permanent diaconate with the proper spirit of pastoral service. Maybe to combat clericalism some system of lay oversight of clerics might have to be devised. But many clergy (especially in Rome) would resist this.

We need to re-emphasise the priesthood of the baptised. We must grow in our conviction that we all share in the one true priesthood of Jesus Christ. 'In Jesus, the Son of God, we have the supreme high priest'. (Hebrews 4:14). Jesus tells us, as he told his first disciples: 'Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all.' (Mark 9:35)
