FATHER LIAM SAYS: The Gospel reading of the Passion that is proclaimed on Good Friday every year is from John's gospel. On Palm Sunday the Gospel of the Passion is either from Matthew, Mark or Luke. This year it is from Mark. Each of these Gospels recount the main events of the public life of Jesus. They give us an account of his deeds and words and they focus on his death and resurrection as the events which give meaning to his whole life. It is through his death and resurrection that Christ's identity as the Son of God is revealed.

Mark is the first to put before us in written form a narrative of the words and deeds of Jesus. But the earliest proclamation of the Gospel was by word of mouth. This was what Christ told his followers to do. No writing of Jesus has come down to us, but his words have continually been changing the face of the earth. Mark opens his written account of Jesus by saying that 'this is the good news of Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God'. In today's account of his death, Mark tells us that the true identity of Jesus is recognised by the Roman centurion when he says 'This is truly the Son of God'.

Mark makes no attempt to conceal the weakness of the apostles. As the crucifixion approaches they all 'deserted him and fled'. The women now take the place of the men. They follow Jesus to the cross. Mark tells us that when John the Baptist had been beheaded, his disciples had stayed loyal to him and buried his body in a tomb. One of the embarrassing memories included in all four gospels is that the body of Jesus was buried by Joseph of Arimathea, who appears in all the four gospels for the first time, after the death of Jesus. He takes courage to do what the apostles of Jesus fail to do. He publicly associated himself with the crucified Jesus. If the members of the Sanhedrin found Jesus guilty, and worthy of death, why does Joseph, a respected member of that Council, approach Pilate for permission to bury the body of Jesus?

Mark is telling us how the pagan centurion responded to Jesus after his death by confessing to his divinity. He had overseen the execution of Jesus and then comes to believe that he is the Son of God. Joseph was a secret disciple of Jesus. Mark says that he was awaiting the Kingdom of God – a pious Jew who lived in expectation of the fulfilment of Israel's messianic hopes. Mark tells us the Joseph 'bought a linen cloth and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock'. Matthew tells us that it was Joseph's 'own new tomb which had been hewn in the rock'. John tells us that Nicodemus, who had previously come to Jesus by night, helped Joseph to bury the body of Jesus.

When someone was sentenced to crucifixion a tablet detailing the charge was made as a warning to others. The tablet was sometimes hung around the neck of the convicted man or paraded before him on the way to execution and then fixed to the cross. The four gospels mention that the written charge against Jesus was 'King of the Jews' though the wording is slightly different in each account. This is the only recorded thing written in his lifetime and it emphasises that it was as Messiah that Jesus was executed. All four gospels mention that there were two criminals crucified alongside Jesus. Only Luke portrays one of them in a favourable light.

Not a whisper of support of Jesus is heard in Mark's account of the crucifixion – apart from the presence of the women. Mark, paints a picture of unrelieved wretchedness. The first disciples were too distressed by these events to ever think of referring to that day as Good Friday. But Paul tells us to glory in the victorious death of Jesus.
