**FATHER LIAM SAYS: Tomorrow– 8th April, we celebrate the** Feast of the Annunciation of the Lord. As it so happens that is also the first Monday of the new Tax Year. Back in history these two events were long connected with each other. This year the connection was totally coincidental. Normally the Church celebrates the Feast of the Annunciation of the Lord on 25th March. As we celebrate the birth of Jesus on 25th December there has been a long tradition in the Church of celebrating the Annunciation nine months earlier in honour of the fact that Mary conceived the Child Jesus by the power of the Holy Spirit on the occasion of the Annunciation. However, a Council of the Church held in Toledo in Spain in the seventh century ordered that the feast be kept on 18th January. The purpose of this ruling was to provide against the inconvenience of celebrating the Annunciation in Lent. And, of course, the date of the commencement of Lent can vary by a matter of several weeks from year to year.

This year 25th March fell in Holy Week so the Feast of the Annunciation is delayed by two weeks. It could not be celebrated in Holy Week, nor in Easter Week because of the importance of these two weeks in our celebration of Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection. The earliest day therefore on which it could be celebrated this year is on 8th April. It is not unusual for the Feast of the Annunciation to be detached from its official date of 25th March with the result that the feast does not always get the importance it deserves. Perhaps the Council of Toledo made a wise decision fourteen centuries ago. By fixing a date in mid-January everyone knew exactly when the important feast would be observed. How many of you knew that tomorrow is the Feast of the Annunciation

For many centuries New Year's Day was observed on the Feast of the Annunciation. It was called Lady's Day in honour of Our Lady. But the Feast is now regarded as a Feast of Our Lord which is why it is called the Feast of the Annunciation of the Lord. The very names given to several months of the year should alert us to the fact that something strange is afoot. September, October, November and December are so named as these were the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth months of the year in ancient times. Our January and February would have been the eleventh and twelfth months leaving March as the first month of the New Year.

The new Tax Year would have coincided with the beginning of the New Year. That is why even today the Tax Year begins when it does. In fact it used to begin several days earlier but the calendar changed from the Julian Calendar dating to the time of Julius Caesar to what became known as the Gregorian Calendar. Over the centuries the Julian Calendar – which was reasonably accurate to begin with – had deviated by ten days from the real Solar calendar. A difference of eleven and a half minutes a year had grown so large over the centuries that Pope Gregory XIII decided that something had to be done. In those days such a huge change could only have been attempted by the Pope and he introduced his calendar in 1582 – 1,600 years after Julius Caesar devised his calendar in 45 BC.

The Great Schism dividing Eastern Christianity from Rome was already nearly 600 years old when the Gregorian Calendar was introduced so the East would have nothing to do with it. Russia only adopted the 'new' calendar in 1918 after the Revolution. Greece waited until 1923 and China followed suit in 1949. When Gregory introduced his calendar, the Reformation was well under way and non-Catholic countries had no desire to follow Rome's way. Queen Elizabeth I came to the throne in 1588 – just six years after Gregory's Calendar. Until 1752 Lady's Day was New Year's Day in England – when contracts were renewed and taxes were levied. But in 1752 England and its colonies adopted the Gregorian Calendar and in that year the beginning of the Tax Year in England was moved eleven days to 6th April where it has remained ever since. How accurate is the Gregorian Calendar now? After 436 years it differs from the Solar year by only 6 seconds.

Every time we say the Hail Mary we recall the Annunciation. This prayer is sometimes called the Angelic Salutation as the Angel Gabriel greeted Mary with the words: 'Hail, full of grace'. (Luke 1:28) The Angelus is a meditation on this central mystery of our faith – 'Christ among you, your hope of Glory' (Colossians 1:27) But in the Easter Season the Angelus is replaced.by a prayer expressing joy in the Resurrection – 'Queen of Heaven, Rejoice, Alleluia'.
