FATHER LIAM SAYS: Rome has probably more church buildings – large and small – than any other city in Christendom and more priests also to celebrate the Eucharist in them. But as long ago as forty years the number of priests ordained for the diocese of Rome was extraordinarily low – only about four ordinations a year, to serve millions of people. Were it not for the hundreds of priests from all over the world who are posted to Roman monasteries and universities and seminaries, the faithful of Rome might feel very neglected as far as Sunday Masses are concerned.

Their situation might be more like the one St Justin the Martyr wrote about in Rome around the year 160 describing the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. "On the day we call the day of the sun, all who dwell in the city or country gather in the same place'. We might think that this meant that practically the whole community managed to participate in the celebration but we have to remember that Sunday was not a day of leisure. Sunday was an ordinary working day and Christians were a persecuted minority. It was not until the Roman Emperors became Christian that Sundays became days of rest. Most people were not masters of their own time. Many were slaves even. People who could make it to the Christian gathering would be subject to denunciation and persecution if they were found out. St Justin in his description of the Sunday Eucharist goes on to mention that the consecrated bread – the Blessed Sacrament – was carried from the assembly to those who were unable to attend. And a large part of the Christian community might not be able to gather around the Eucharistic Table. Their only way to participate in the Sunday Eucharist was through their reception of Holy Communion.

Of course, the ideal is that we gather together to celebrate the Eucharist. As St Peter reminds us, we are a Royal priesthood. We share in the priesthood of Christ and we offer all glory and honour to the Father in Christ and with Christ and through Christ. But what is to happen when Sunday Mass is not available in every parish? Should we all be expected to make every effort to travel to the nearest place where Sunday Mass is celebrated? But a parish is a community of worshipers, and it is important that we worship together. Shoppers are individuals and often travel some distance to get to their nearest Sainsbury's/Tesco's Supermarket but is this how we are meant to view our Sunday worship?

It could be argued that even when Sunday Mass cannot be celebrated regularly by our own local community we should gather as a community to worship together – as Catholic communities do in so many parts of the world and have been doing for many years. They celebrate the Liturgy of the Word and receive Holy Communion that had been consecrated at a previous Mass. The principal reason why the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the Tabernacle is that it can be offered to those who cannot present themselves at Mass. In so many parts of the Catholic world that is the situation. Though they cannot regularly celebrate Mass together they are not deprived of the Eucharist. Given the present discipline of the Church, we are being increasingly faced with a challenging future. But it is our right as a Christian community to be actively engaged in our parish as loving brothers and sisters in Christ, which the Eucharist strengthens us to do. St Paul tells us: 'We though many, are one body, because we partake on one bread'. Even when we cannot regularly gather for Mass we need not be deprived of the Eucharist.

The term 'Sunday Eucharist' has long been extended to include Saturday evening. This was largely in response to the changing conditions in our society. I wonder could the 'Sunday Eucharist' be further extended to include the whole weekend, starting on Friday night? In our Deanery this could be regarded as having taken place already. The prison at Ford has been having their weekly Mass on Friday afternoons for some years. The local priest serves two parishes, Littlehampton and Rustington – so he has extended his reach to cover a longer weekend.

In many mission lands Sunday Mass is celebrated on whatever day it is possible to gather the people around the altar. I know as little about the future as the next person but I do know that it will be different. What a shame it would be if it were the case that 'The hungry sheep look up and are not fed!'
